Applies to cities of (Senate amndmnt 150K pop) 90,000+ located in counties of 300,000+. Residential lots cannot be required to be larger than 1,400 sq ft, wider than 20 ft, deeper than 60 ft or a density less than 31.1 units per acre. Lots less than 4,000 sq ft cannot be required to have side and rear setbacks greater than 5 ft, covered parking, more than one parking space per unit, off-site parking, etc. Cities can still require all subdivisions and small lots to fully mitigate stormwater runoff. No effect on HOAs or deed restrictions. A person 'affected or aggrieved' by a city's violation of this chapter can sue the city or employee of the city.
